

Summary of April meeting Bettas not made for bowls, a huge auction, and a food decision

April Program: Steve Ehrlich presented information and pictures about the many species of betta, how to get them, and how to breed and take care of them. The program was well organized to highlight the grouping of similar species that is currently going on by those scientists who study bettas, making it easier to understand habitat and reproductive needs. As his own habitat is limited to an apartment, Steve's most extensive experience lies with those betta which he can keep and breed in smallish (by cichlid keeper standards) community tanks. He shared a good deal of information about the mouth brooding bettas as well as the bubble nest builders, and his slides showed the magnificent color and patterns these fish have.

Caitlyn Downing used the slides of betta as a starting point for her own interpretations of wild bettas. She went on to draw other fish and humorous illustrations of possible fish, which will be featured in future Showfish

The auction was huge this month, and Duncan Mahoney called the lots with alacrity to get all the lots presented for





bidding in time to check out and leave without overstaying our time. You had to be on your toes to get what you wanted! Among the delicacies on the table: three inch diameter discus of various color varieties from a brand new member, including a wild brown one; orange *Eretmodus cyanostictus*, which has never been auctioned in the decade I've been a member of COAST; several fine breeding pairs of angels; some [of my favorite] shell-dwelling cichlids from Lake Tanganyika, *Lamprologus meleagris* (*I lost the bid*); some pygmy chain sword *Echinodorus tenellus* and the rare and tiny ground cover, *Hemianthus callitrichoides* "Cuba".

Tom Varin volunteered to bring in lunch buffet foods each month up to the amount the club allows for reimbursement. This means you can count on having food for lunch now (not just snacks), and you can count on having to pay a couple of bucks per person for it unless you contribute food to the buffet yourself (in which case your buffet is free).

Species Profile – Epactionotus aky, newly described A small green Argentinean catfish discovered in November 2002

by Roberto Petracini and Francisco Martinez of Argentina, translated by Viviana Garber, originally published



In November 2002, while doing field work in Posadas, Misiones, Argentina, José Antonio Granados (AEA) and Roberto Petracini (Argentine Killi Club - KCA) found a number of catfish of a new species. Other collectors later found more specimens, and it was eventually described by Azpelicueta, Casciotta, Almirón and Korber in 2004.

Habitat

They live in fast water on *Echinodorus* (sword plant) leaves, eating algae.





Broad Leaf Amazon Sword Plant (*Echinodorus bleheri* or *E. paniculatus*) need a rich substrate with clay and abundant trace minerals added regularly, especially iron. Lighting, pH, and hardness aren't critical, temp 68-81°F; tolerates hard, alkaline water and medium to low light. — Editor



Starting with wild-caught specimens, the species has been bred in captivity, as follows

Aquarium

- Tropical, with plants such as *Echinodorus*, (e.g. *E. horemanii*) and intense lighting to provide lots of algae.
- Substrate of sand or gravel with bogwood
- pH: 7-7.2, dH: 10 (170 ppm), temperature: 22 26°C





Epactionotus aky
Geographic distribution is very limited and the fish are few in number. Future conservation is considered very difficult.

Reproduction


- The male (4cm) is thinner than the female (5.5 cm)
- Eggs are laid on the *Echinodorus* leaves (and also on the aquarium glass).
- The fry hatch within 36 40 hours, and attach themselves by the mouth to the plant leaves or aquarium glass.
- Fry that are not provided with *Echinodorus* plants are found to be 20 25% slower growing, so it can be deduced that an essential element in their diet is algae that is present only with that plant.
- After 30 days, the fry are 1.5 1.8 cm., and after 60 days they are 3.5 4 cm.
- Growth is very easy and fast.

Feeding •

• Adults adapt to common fish food such as flakes, but it is important to provide *Echinodorus* plants.


Remark

Technical reference: A new species of fluorescent green loricariid catfish, discovered in 2002 in the Rio Uruguay basin of Misiones, Argentina, has been named *Epactionotus aky* by MDLM Azpellicueta , J. Casciotta, A. Almiron, and S. Korber in the journal Verhandlungen der Gesselschaft fur Ichthyologie 2004: 81-90 in the article "A new species of Otothyrini (Siluriformes: Loricariidae: Hypoptopomatinae) from the Rio Uruguay basin, Argentina". At first thought to be a Hisonotus species, this tiny catfish is a part of the hypoptopomine tribe of Otothyrini. Not a lot is known about the fish, which is believed to hide on the undersides of *Echinodorus* leaves. It is unclear how much of the green coloration is influenced by mood, water quality, or diet. See the Species Profile above for information from two men who collected and bred them. – Editor.
